Our Year 2021 in review

As we step into a new year, on behalf of everyone at the Aig-Imoukhuede Foundation, I would like to thank you for your support throughout the year 2021. We recognise that partnership and collaboration are key drivers to our success, and as we work to achieve our mission to improve public service delivery and access to quality primary healthcare in Nigeria and Africa, we are thankful for the relationships and partnerships that have been developed and strengthened thus far.

We are delighted that our partnership with the Office of the Head of the Civil Service of the Federation (OHCSF) to support its reform efforts yielded positive results in 2021, in addition to driving the digitalisation of the OHCSF's business process, of which the development of <u>standard operating</u> <u>processes</u> for all its departments was the first step: We are also facilitating the OHCSF's ISO certification efforts, advising on the development of in-house capacity-building training projects and working on a culture-change project to align the values of civil servants with the objectives of the new, improved civil service.



We leveraged our long-standing partnership with the Blavatnik School of Government at the University of Oxford to develop our incountry executive education programme for public sector leaders, the AIG Public Leaders Programme, and the inaugural class of 50 promising future leaders commenced the programme in September 2021. We continued our work with the Nigerian Economic Summit Group (NESG), making considerable progress with the Aig-Imoukhuede Public Sector Performance Index, which we are developing in conjunction with the Governance and Institutions Policy Commission of the NESG. September, the 5th cohort of AIG Scholars arrived in Oxford to begin their master's degree in public policy, bringing the total number of AIG Scholars we have sponsored up to 27. In addition, we have commissioned the NESG to conduct in-depth research on the history of public sector reforms in Nigeria, which we will leverage to develop.



Our work would not be possible without the support of the wonderful Panel of Advisors of the Africa Initiative for Governance, who started this journey with us six years ago. We are thankful for their unwavering commitment to our mission and delighted that they have all agreed to serve on the Aig-Imoukhuede Foundation Leadership Council, which we will constitute in early 2022.

In 2022, we are excited to build on our achievements of the past year and to scale our work for greater impact. We hope we can continue to rely on your support as we work to achieve our vision of closing the gap between Africa and the rest of the world.

Following a short internship at the West Africa Civil Society Institute in Ghana, he was selected as a Leaving the Tarmac mentored intern.


